## Space to Grow transforms campuses at three Chicago Public Schools

WHO: Partners behind the award winning Space to Grow program, including the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago (MWRD), Healthy Schools Campaign, Openlands, Chicago Department of Water Management and Chicago Public Schools (CPS) officials will join students, teach-

ers and school communities.

WHAT: Ribbon cuttings will be held at three schools to formally celebrate the completion of three schoolyard

transformation projects that work to improve school grounds and retain water.

Three more Space to Grow schoolyards are complete, and it's time to put these campuses on display and available to the communities that will use them. There will be a brief ceremony and remarks followed by schoolyard activities to celebrate the occasion. Space to Grow transforms Chicago schoolyards into community spaces for physical activity, outdoor learning, environmental literacy and engagement with art, while addressing neighborhood flooding issues. In addition to providing community members in low-income neighborhoods with safe outdoor spaces to play and stay active, Space to Grow schoolyards help CPS meet daily recess and physical education requirements for elementary schools.

A joint venture operated through the financial and technical support of the MWRD, the Chicago Department of Water Management, and CPS, Space to Grow is managed by the Healthy Schools Campaign and Openlands organizations. The partners have worked to design and install the new playgrounds utilizing green infrastructure. The projects will reduce flooding, reduce the load on the combined sewer system, and educate students and neighbors about green infrastructure techniques and purpose.

Space to Grow has already won a number of awards, including the 2016 National Association of Flood and Stormwater Management Agencies' first place Green Infrastructure award and the 2016 Best of Green School Award for Collaboration by the Center for Green Schools at the U.S. Green Building Council (USGBC) in collaboration

ration with the Green Schools National Network. The partnership has also received the Chapter Mission Award from the USGBC Illinois Chapter, the Sustainability Award from the Illinois Association for Floodplain and Stormwater Management and a "New Champions" award from the National Physical Activity Plan Alliance.
