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Leland Elementary School partnership helps students learn about the water treatment process

George Leland Elementary School continues to bring programming to students to help them achieve their potential, and the recent Family Night and Career Fair helped acquaint students with STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Math) careers. These two events also continued the partnership developed with the Metropolitan Water Reclamation District of Greater Chicago (MWRD).

During Family Night on May 3, MWRD Vice President Barbara McGowan explained the water treatment process and helped students color a water reclamation display. MWRD Public Affairs Specialist Rebecca Wooley gave a water quiz to older students for a chance to win MWRD sunglasses. During the Career Fair on May 10, MWRD Lab Technician Bonnie Davis showed students samples of microorganisms under a microscope and explained their importance in helping to clean used water.

Turon Ivy, M.Ed., is Leland School's Principal. He explained that the school's mission is to provide an academic program in a caring and supportive learning

environment while tailoring curricula to meet the needs of students.

"Our students have a variety of needs so we develop programming such as Family Night and the career fairs to ensure each student has the opportunity to attain his or her maximum potential," said Principal Ivy.

The MWRD/Leland School partnership began in 2014 when Leland was selected as a Space to Grow School, a partnership between the Healthy Schools Campaign, Openlands, MWRD, Chicago Public Schools, and the Chicago Dept. of Water Management. After more than a year of community planning and several months of construction, the educational schoolyard was completed. It features stormwater collection elements while also providing a space for the students and community to enjoy.
